

Students Recognized For Overcoming Challenges

The Loudoun County chapter of the Beat the Odds Program held its fifth annual Scholarship Awards Ceremony Thursday night, celebrating students who have overcome significant adversity, such as poverty, violence, substance abuse and family break ups, to achieve academic and personal success.

Initiated by the Loudoun County Bar Association in conjunction with the Sheriff's Office and other agencies, the program awards scholarships for higher education and vocational training to youths who are or have been clients of the Juvenile and Domestics Court, The Juvenile Services Unit, the Department of Mental Health, Retardation and Substance Abuse, or the Department of Social Services.

Washington Redskins wide receiver James Thrash provided the keynote speech for the ceremony, talking about the many challenges he has over come in his own life to achieve success as a professional football player. He talked about growing up with an abusive father and transferring high schools four times in his freshman year alone.

Thrash compared over coming life's challenges with running a sprint race, saying, "In a race, you are never judged on you start. It doesn't even matter what you look like when you're running. The only thing they use to determine the winner is how you finish the race, and I really feel like running a race is very relative to life. We are never remembered for how we start out in life, we are only remembered for how we finish. And I want to pose a question today: how are you going to finish the race? How will your story end?"
